The Florence Township Council held a regular meeting on the above date in the Municipal Complex, 711 Broad Street, Florence, New Jersey.

The meeting was called to order by Council President Lovenduski at 8:00 PM. Council President Lovenduski led the Salute to the Flag.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Michael Sassman, owner of 1301 Hornberger Avenue, said he received a tax abatement for the property in May. The building was supposed to be completed in May but there have been problems. He had a partner on that project and his partner had hired all of the subcontractors for the project. He tried to work with them but it was difficult to work with them because they felt a loyalty to his former partner. He has changed to new subcontractors. Much of the work inside the building is done. He hasn’t had an inspection. He is short with the fire requirements but it is very close to being complete. For the last several months he has been dealing with paperwork and trying to get different contractors. He said the holdup has been the paperwork from his former partner. He thought he would have been through it much faster. He was here this evening to ask that he would be able to keep the tax abatement. He hopes to have the project completed in a couple months.

Council Member Sandusky said many of those in attendance this evening have been riding past the property almost daily for years and they see nothing being done. Council provided the tax abatement and there is still nothing done. There are many people who are asking Council and Mayor Wilkie when the building is going to be completed? He would be willing to continue the tax abatement but there would need to be some kind schedule that is township approved regarding the work that needs to be done.

Mr. Sassman said he did many projects in Florence and always completed them. He bought several properties from the township. The problem has nothing to do with the township, he picked the wrong partner. Mr. Sassman said he took it upon himself to finish the project and is using his own personal funds.

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He is disappointed that it is not finished. A building like that should only take about three years to complete. The tax incentive is good and he has completed a lot inside that can't be seen from the outside. He wants to get the building done; he is embarrassed that it isn't. He had a good reputation from his other projects and this makes him look bad.

Council President Lovenduski said Council would like to see the building finished also. A lot of the problem is that people look in it and see an unfinished building. The inside is visible. Mr. Sassman said that is true in the commercial part, but in the living units all the granite has been set in the kitchens. Council President Lovenduski said the other issue he has is that when the township asks Mr. Sassman for updates, they don't receive answers. He thinks the township should not have had the ordinance tonight to finally get a response from him. The township has tried to work with him and gave him many chances. It seems it was falling on deaf ears. This evening was the first time he came to a meeting and the building is about six years old. He understands that there have been problems and the township is more than willing to work with him but he needs to communicate.

Mr. Sassman said it would have been easier for him to just let the building be foreclosed on. He invested over \$1 million in the property. He said he needs to work on the communication and he apologized for that. He wants to finish the building not for a big financial gain but because he started it. The realtors have people who would rent the apartments, so that is what he is focusing on now.

Council President Lovenduski asked what Mr. Sassman thought would be his finish date? Mr. Sassman said he would need at least a couple months. It's not so much the work, he can finish that. He said he would provide a tour. Right now there are paperwork problems and a lot of things to unravel. Council President Lovenduski said he would like to see what has been done so far. He receives more questions about that building than anything else in town. Mr. Sassman said he tries to keep it clean and maintained. The commercial space would not be finished until there was a tenant but there is already interest in the residential.

Council President Lovenduski said at this point Mr. Sassman needs to provide a date that he would be moving in. If he doesn't meet the goal, he would lose the tax abatement. Council Member Woolston said moving in would need to be defined. Mr. Sassman could get a TCO for the residential. The commercial part won't be done until he gets a tenant and gets fitted out. That could be two months or it could be two more years. He would like a date for the actual completion of the project. Mr. Sassman said he can't complete the commercial portion until he knows who would be there.

Council Member Woolston said he would need CO's by then because the outside should be completed. Mr. Sassman said with the TCO there would be a basecoating of the blacktop and everything would be striped. He reviewed with the township everything he would need for the TCO so he could start generating some income. As he gets people in the building, he can work on finishing things up.

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Council Member Woolston said that leaves the building with the blacktop half done and there would be people living there. It would be a safety issue. Council Member Woolston said there is no reason to not put the top coat on. Mr. Sassman said he would not be able to do the blacktop because it would probably cost about \$50,000. Council Member Woolston asked if it is an issue of money? Mr. Sassman said he would like to be given until December 1st and offered to provide a tour in a few weeks to show what he has done. Hopefully, he will get the paperwork done and be in the building in two months but he doesn't want to say that and then have to come back and ask for more time.

Council President Lovenduski said he understood that but he agrees with Council Member Woolston. The top coating is not a hidden cost; it is a cost that was there from the beginning. He is sympathetic to what happened to Mr. Sassman but at some point it has to be done and there has to be people there. He never sees anyone there working. There is a large amount of focus put on that building.

Council Vice President Ostrander said he would be willing to agree with the December 1st deadline. Council Member Baldorossi also agreed to the deadline. Council President Lovenduski explained that if the work was not completed by the deadline, Council would go through with the Ordinance canceling the tax abatement. Mr. Sassman agreed and said it was more than fair.

Council Member Woolston said he didn't like the idea of issuing a TCO without the blacktop being completed. A TCO is for when you are waiting for smaller things to be done, like grass. Not finishing the blacktop; it is a safety issue.

Administrator Brook said he thinks Mr. Sassman understands that Council is seeking finality of the project. He told Mr. Sassman that Council does want the top paved. He has never seen a TCO issued without a top pave. Usually when a TCO is issued, it is when a majority of the site plan work is completed. Once a TCO is issued, it would be very difficult to force that hand. This is all about trying to bring it to a conclusion for everyone. He said he does think that Mr. & Mrs. Sassman are sincere and really intend to complete the work. If Council is willing to give him until December, it is more that reasonable.

Mayor Wilkie said Mr. Sassman has heard what Council had to say and they have been more than reasonable. He has been Mayor for four and a half years and this was the first time he had seen Mr. Sassman at a meeting. There was no communication when Mr. Sassman didn't meet his first deadlines. The issue of communication is very important. Everyone has problems and issues but he needed to communicate with the township.

He requested that Mr. Sassman clean the windows in his Main Street property. Those are the types of things people are looking at. People are looking for progress. He asked that Mr. Sassman make the property as nice as possible.

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Mayor Wilkie said he had spoken to the school district and they were appreciative of Mr. Sassman letting them use the parking lot at different times for the school to use, especially Back to School Nights, which will be coming up soon. Mr. Sassman said he doesn't mind doing it. Mayor Wilkie said the township appreciated his cooperation and wanted him to be a partner in the community. Mayor Wilkie said he was aware of Mr. Sassman's reputation for building good homes.

Administrator Brook said the Mayor and Council want Mr. Sassman to succeed. Mr. Sassman said he really wants to finish it. Administrator Brook said they want to see him succeed on behalf of the community; that's who they represent.

The Mayor and Council thanked Mr. Sassman for attending and for his input.

Don Kamienski, 10 McCay Drive, thanked Administrator Brook and Assistant Administrator Sahol for helping to coordinate the removal of the bush that was at Station Road and Route 130 South. That was a significant safety issue. It blocked the line of sight. He thanked them again.

Seeing no one else wishing to be heard, it was the Motion of Ostrander and seconded by Sandusky to close the public comments. Roll call vote – all ayes. Unanimous approval.

Mayor Wilkie explained it was a two-year union contract with the CWA, comprised of Public Works, Water & Sewer and office personnel. It is retroactive back to January 1, 2016. It runs through December 31, 2017. There was a two percent raise for this year and three percent come January.

Administrator Brook said when the township was hit with the recession, as was everyone else, all three unions came in and made concessions during that time. They did it voluntarily and to help one another and to help the municipality and that was an extremely rough time. The non-union employees also made concessions.

At this time the meeting was opened to the public regarding Ordinance No. 2016-26. Seeing no one wishing to be heard, it was the Motion of Ostrander and seconded by Woolston to close the public hearing. Roll call vote - all ayes. Motion carried. Unanimous approval.

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Council President Lovenduski said this ordinance grants about eight parking spots to St. Mary's Church on Sundays from 7:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. It allows elder parishioners to park somewhat close to the church. Parking is a premium in the area.

At this time, the meeting was opened to the public regarding Ordinance No. 2016-27.

Michael Bunnick, 12 Seventh Avenue resident and representative of the church, said the parking issue has been going on for a while. The appeal for help started at the Zoning Board and then came to Council. Then a plan was laid out and the plan was changed. He said on the church property there are four spots on the sidewalk side of the street and four on the railroad side of the street. The fit is perfect. He met with Father David and created something that would be provided to the parishioners once the ordinance is approved. He hoped everything works out and he can take good news back to the parishioners.

It was the Motion of Baldorossi and seconded by Ostrander to close the public hearing. Roll call vote - all yeas. Unanimous approval.

Council Member Sandusky said St. Mary's is lucky that they have someone like Mr. Bunnick to take care of them. The parish is getting older and it is harder for the older people to walk the distance to get to the church. He thanked Mr. Bunnick for what he did for the parishioners.

Council Member Sandusky also thanked Mr. Sassman for attending this evening. It meant a lot to Council to see and hear from him. Mr. Sassman thanked him and said he appreciated the extension.

Mayor

Proclamation – National Constitution Week, September 17th-23rd

Mayor Wilkie read the proclamation into the record. He noted it was signed by himself, all members of Council, Clerk Weiler and Administrator Brook. He thanked everyone for their cooperation.

Earlier this evening the first **Roebling Park Committee** meeting was held. This was a brainstorming session. He provided a map of the area being discussed. This is a very unique opportunity for the community. The committee is working together and there were many ideas presented. The committee will be meeting on the first Wednesday of the month for the next two months. Updates will be provided and it was a productive meeting. There was a mixture of many different ideas; some passive and some active. It was agreed that the Burlington County grant that was received would be used to purchase trees, trash receptacles and benches.

The **Heritage Trail** along the Delaware River received some publicity. He noted on the provided map where Hedding was located. It is part of Mansfield Township. There is an access that is going to go through the bridge roughly where the asphalt plant is. Eventually there will be access along the river in Roebling. There is a very nice area that presently is only accessible by boat. The walkway will continue and tie into the new park that is in Roebling. In the near future there will be access to the trail. It is supposed to run along the river but unfortunately a lot of places aren't accessing. At least Florence's area will be able to have that.

Florence Township **Memorial High School** will have its first home football game Friday night against long-time rival Burlington City.

Saturday is the Township-Wide **Free Yard Sale Day**. He encouraged everyone to participate but hoped any signs would be removed after. Saturday evening at 5:00 p.m. Recreation Soccer will be holding its **Fun Night at Veteran's Field**.

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The following weekend on **September 17th St. Stephen's will be having its annual car show.** The **Florence Historical Society** is holding its **Open House** at the West Third Street Fire House. The building should be ready in time. The roof was just repaired because there was a leak.

In the packet there was a letter from the county responding to the letter the township sent them requesting **crossing signs**. Burlington County would pay half and the township would pay half but the township would pay one hundred percent of the electricity. There would be an overhead light at the high school where there is a crossing from the bike path. It would be for "warning". The same thing would be installed at Front and Broad Streets and at Front Street and Boulevard. There were some other improvements the county said they would do without cost to the township. He wanted to make sure Council was aware and had no concerns. It is typical and would be a nice improvement to the community. Administrator Brook said a resolution would not be necessary, if Council was in agreement, he would make sure the funds were placed in the budget. Mayor Wilkie asked for Council to pass a motion to agree with the financial obligation.

It was the **Motion** of Sandusky and seconded by Ostrander to move forward with the financial obligation. Roll call vote - ayes. Unanimous approval.

Mayor Wilkie said Administrator Brook completed his investigation into the **Recreation Basketball Program**. Any action that needs to be taken will be handled administratively. The issue that he sees is that there needs to be an agreement between the township and each of the recreation programs that officers of the leagues need to agree to do certain things or they will not receive funding and will not be allowed use of facilities.

Administrator Brook said he was glad that Council was willing to move forward with the pedestrian signals. He feels it would be best to do a **resolution** for the next meeting because it is a **shared services agreement**.

Mayor Wilkie said when decisions are made in Trenton sometimes the residents are affected. The decision that was made on July 1 to shut down the **Transportation Trust Fund** projects. That is why the work on Hornberger Avenue halted. The township was able to get permission to finish the safety issues. There was work done on the sidewalks over the last couple of weeks but there is also visible crushed stone in areas where there should be pavement and until the state gives authorization to finish paving, it will remain as-is. The sad part is that the project is ready to be done.

Township Administrator

Administrator Brook said to follow up on the recreation report, it is clear that there are issues with that particular league. He thinks new leadership will be an improvement. It is quite evident that there were concerns and it was best that a review was done. Sometimes there just needs to be a change for the better. There were inconsistencies and certain accountability concerns. They are documented.

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With new leadership the league should have a much better season going forward. He said if there were any questions, he would be glad to meet with anyone to discuss it in depth.

He said the township is going to move forward with the **Griffin Pipe Redevelopment Plan**. There is a company that is remediating the site on the river side of the property. The plan will most likely go to the Planning Board in October or November.

The Verizon letter that was in the packet looked like something unimportant. But it is something that many other towns are dealing with. When Verizon reaches a point in a municipality where it has access to less than fifty percent of dial-up service, they eliminate the business property tax for the community. For Florence it means about \$51,000 which will be taken into account in the 2017 budget. He will check with the League of Municipalities to see how other towns are dealing with it such as with litigation or class action movement that would have substance to it. If not, the township does not want to waste taxpayer's money. This is something that has been happening quite a bit in North Jersey and now it is filtering down to South Jersey and towns the size of Florence, Delran and others.

There was a meeting regarding the **Water & Sewer plant**. There have been issues from some other towns and the county in the newspapers. As debt service is paid off, much the way a home mortgage is, the township continues to look at how it can invest in its infrastructure. The township is currently examining a significant upgrade to the Water Treatment Plant that should leave the township in good shape for the next thirty years. The first draft will be presented in October. The work will be done in two phases. He will go through it in quite some depth at that time. Looking at the age of the plant and the condition of the building, it is much better to be ahead of the curve than in the situation some other municipalities are facing. It is a good conceptual plan, created by Director of Water & Sewer David Lebak, Assistant Administrator Sahol and the Township Engineers. As the debt service starts to go away more will be added, so in essence everything is staying pretty stable, but the township is making an investment into the infrastructure. The plan will include an expansion of the plant and some adjustments to two aerators. The reason for two is that if one aerator is taken out of service for maintenance, there is another one. The plant cannot be run on the pumps twenty-four hours a day. He hopes Phase One can be done in 2017.

It is unusual and rare and pleasant to have people of the caliber of **Nancy Erlston** and Clerk Weiler where one is going to take over for the other. He complimented them on their professionalism. They are working together for six months so that when Township Clerk Weiler leaves, Ms. Erlston will be well informed and in as good a position as possible. He thanked both of them for all that they do.

Assistant Administrator

Assistant Administrator Sahol said **Jabbo's** was on the agenda for this evening. About a year ago there was a bond ordinance and there were several projects that were municipal properties.

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One thing that was contemplated was how to preserve the Jabbo's building and keep the historic building alive for some ultimate reuse. The roof needs to be done, some pointing and some windows need attention and security needs to be addressed. Recently he met with some roofing contractors and he has begun the process of trying to determine what the best course of action is. He spoke to the chairperson of the Historic Preservation Commission. At this point the course of action would be to remove the tin roof that at some point was applied to what he believes was a shake roof and bring it up to ridge like it once had. Right now there is flat spot on the top that is holding water. He suggested using an architectural shingle that would give it the shaked look that it once had. At this point he wanted to let Council know that the township is moving forward to preserve that property and enclose it. He and Engineer Biegen have been discussing trying to find end users for the property. It could be a small professional office or an answering service for multiple professionals in the community that want to use it and pool all of their resources. He would like to get it occupied and bring it to back to some good use. Right now the goal is to get the building enclosed and weather tight. He wanted to bring it to Council's attention that the project would be moving forward before fall and winter set in.

Assistant Administrator Sahol said the Mayor alluded to the renovation of the Third Street Firehouse in response to the water leak that occurred. The wall structures have all been repaired. The sheetrock was damaged. The bathrooms where the leak occurred were repaired. The flooring is being replaced tomorrow. The vanity fixtures will be going in next week. The building will be ready for the Florence Historical Society Open House.

Hornberger Avenue sidewalks are all safe at this point. The contractor moved away from there and is working on Olive Street. He will be going to West Fifth Street, doing a handicapped ramp on West Fourth Street and then will do the work on Broad Street between Ninth Street and Broad Street. The contractor is thinking about getting all of the concrete work done and then do all the milling and paving at once. He will advise Mayor and Council as soon as he knows for sure.

The spread footings for the **salt barn** are done and the wall structures have been formed and the walls will be poured tomorrow or Friday. The building is set to arrive in pieces the end of next week. The building is very tall. It is still on track for the load out by the end of October or possibly sooner.

He reminded everyone that the **farmer's market** was the next day.

Public Comments: Open to the Public

Jennifer Brennen, 700 Olive Street, said there has been a lot of speeding. It has been happening since she's lived here. It is happening down Cedar Lane in the middle of the night. She hears motorcycles and it sounds like they are going very fast. Kids play out there and it is dangerous.

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Mayor Wilkie said she could go to the website and make a request to the Police Department to have the speed signs put in that area. Administrator Brook said he would ask the Chief about it.

Mr. Kamienski asked why there were helicopters flying around his house this evening? Mayor Wilkie said there was an incident and the authorities were following up. He was told the victim is not in a life threatening situation. But as of ten minutes ago the person was still at-large. There are helicopters and dogs searching.
